**Sir Peter Hall** is Vice Chair of Global Urban Development, and Bartlett Professor of Planning and Regeneration at University College, London, UK, where he is also a Senior Research Fellow at the Young Foundation. His many books include *The World Cities*, *Cities in Civilization*, *Urban and Regional Planning*, *Cities of Tomorrow*, *Urban Future 21*, *Technopoles of the World*, and *Silicon Landscapes*.
